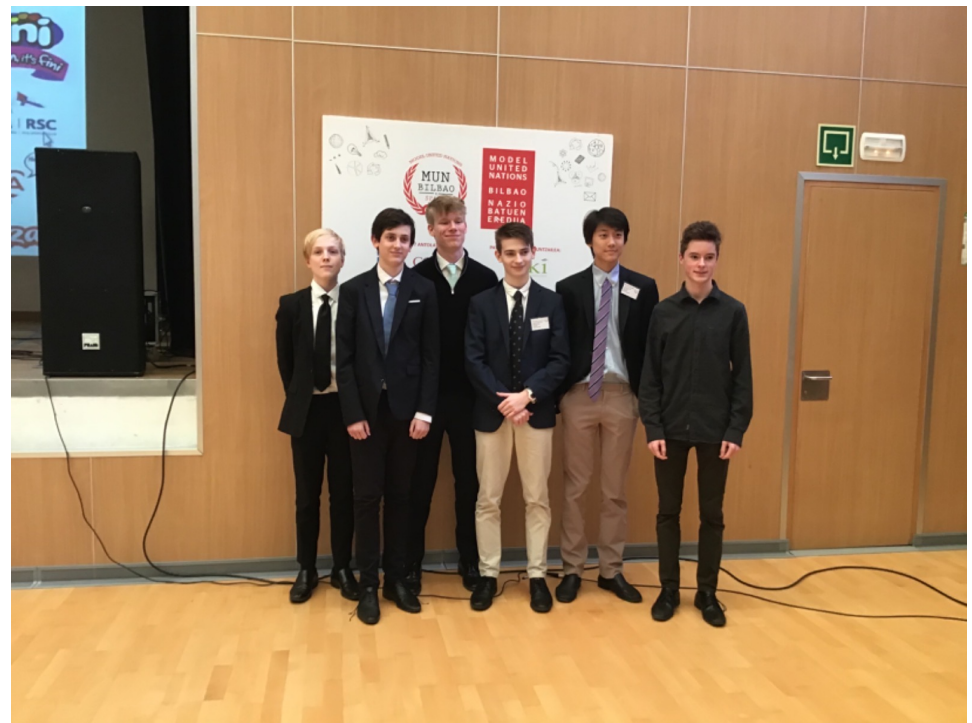

Kudzai Mukaratirwa

Could you explain who you are?

My name is Kudzai Mukaratirwa, I am from Harare, Zimbabwe and I currently work as a consultant for the United Nations office for Drugs and Crime on the youth program for the regional office for East Africa.

How did you manage to get where you are?

I started when I was 17 or 18 years old and I was involved with Model United Nations, I later I went to volunteer for the online Model United Nations, where I worked with education, Model United Nations, youth engagement and youth programmes and over the years I began implementing programs that impacted young people on community level through MUN. As the world adopted the SDG agenda I moved towards the Sustainable Development Goals and the role of young people making sure we reach them. We can get young people as actors not bystanders and not to be cheated as an afterthought. Through this I became an expert adviser for the audited nations program for Co-education for Justice under the Global Program.
